

Green Architecture Day - Saturday 4 March 2006

Report on event & recommendations for future

On the whole the event was deemed to be very successful with 112 people attending the talks & approximately a further 100 people visiting the stalls & exhibitions.

These comments are based on feedback informally provided by speakers, stallholders, volunteers & also the feedback provided by participants evaluation sheet, summarised at the end of this document.

It is presumed that the event will be run again in 2007 & this report is mainly focused on recommendations for this & other similar events.

Publicity

Coverage achieved

- o 200 posters & 2000 leaflets distributed [a further 1000 leaflets were printed but not distributed]
- o Full information provided on web page
- o Brighton Permaculture Trust email list mailed
- o Architects practices in England & Wales & some sustainability officers in SE emailed
- Details posted on a number of web sites & distributed on several email listings
- o Coverage in 'City News' & 'The Argus'

Recommendations for future:

- o Many people reported having not seen information distributed so further promotion is desirable
- o More posters could have been distributed [500?] but only 2000 leaflets should be printed
- o Leaflets are expensive & wasteful of paper so large increases in use is not desirable
- o Magazine adverts are expensive & may not be cost effective
- o Much more attention could be paid to media coverage [newspapers, magazines, radio, TV, etc.]

Booking arrangements

People visiting stalls & exhibitions did not need to book

Booking system for talks:

- People could reserve a place on line or by requesting a paper booking form by phone
- o 79 people reserved a place on line
- 1 person booked by post
- o 19 of those reserving a place on line did not then make a payment & did not attend on the day
- A further 20 people attended as part of Brighton Permaculture Trust's 'Building Sustainable Communities Course'
- 19 people who had not booked attended the talks & paid on the day

Recommendations for future:

- The online system could be greatly improved by combining reservation & payment into a single stage booking procedure
- o The online system could be made more user friendly & the form split over several pages
- o Considerable time could be saved by automating the data management systems
- Registration systems on the day coped but were strained to the limits, better designed systems & volunteer briefing is necessary for such events in future

Attendance

Comments:

- o Attendance levels both for the talks & stalls/exhibitions were in the region hoped for
- Participants for the talks included architects, engineers, academics, planners, LA officers, councillors, students [of architecture, engineering & environment] & interested members of the public [the later comprising a little over 50% of the audience]
- o at least 15% of participants had attended previous Green Architecture Days

Recommendations for future:

- o A maximum of 150 is probably desirable for talks
- o If future events attract too many bookings then further events should be laid on

Venue

Comments:

Recommendations for future:

- o If BHCC is unable to support the event in future a cheaper venue needs to be found
- o A venue with natural light, better ventilation & heat control would be desirable
- o If the stalls/exhibitions are to be expanded & are to be open to the public more space is needed
- If the same venue is used the stalls/exhibitions need to be moved, perhaps to where food was served with food being served in the screened space

2.30	Grow your own building – making best use of local timber in construction David Saunders David, the manager of Weald Woodnet, will present several case studies of projects he's led demonstrating the use of local timber in construction and renewable energy from wood and pose some challenges for the future development of our rural timber resources. Developments at The Woodland Enterprise Centre at Flimwell show new ways of using sweet chestnut from woodlands that have fallen into disuse. David has also has played an active role in developing the TimberBuild Network SE and Lignatherm Ltd a heat supply company offering automated wood-heating systems.

3.30	Strawbale houses – sustainable urban choices Amazon Nails Amazon Nails-Strawbale futures will give a presentation on the latest developments in strawbale building, including work for the Ecology Building Society, Housing Association bungalows in Birmingham, and large warehouse space for Sworders Auctioneers. They have pioneered shallow foundations through Building Regulations in 2005 and will also talk on the wider applications of low-impact foundations.			
4.15	Plenary session			

Comments:

- o On the whole a good balance of talks were well received
- Speakers were well prepared & gave good clear presentations
- A high proportion of people in the audience were interested in self-build
- Timing significantly overran on two sessions leading to the day finishing at 5, the late finishing did not in itself cause any problems though some people expressed frustration about talks overrunning

Recommendations for future:

- o A similar number & balance of speakers be used for future events
- o In the interest of providing something new each year only the introductory session by Duncan Baker-Brown should be repeated [at least 15% of participants had attended previous Green Architecture Days]
- Speakers should be better briefed to keep to time & give sufficient time for Q & A
- o Remote operation of the projector would be desirable so that speakers can stand, or a lectern used.
- A larger screen would have more impact

Comments:

- A diverse range of stalls attracted considerable attention from both participants at the talks & visiting members of the public
- o Feedback from talks participants indicated they would like to have seen more

Recommendations for future:

- This part of the day could be considerably expanded in future
- Attention needs to be given to making this part of the day cover its costs, those wishing to exhibit seem unwilling to make any significant payment for the space [venues with a space for exhibitions seem to cost significantly more as well as organisation time needing to be covered]

Lunch & refreshments

Comments:

- o Lunch was provided at a very low cost by Fran Pickering [BPT Trustee] with most the work being voluntary.
- o It was generally very well received but some would have liked the opportunity to pay less & not have lunch.
- A few people did opt to leave the venue to buy their own lunch, some returning late for the afternoon session.

Recommendations for future:

- o Lunch should be optional in the future, but booked & paid for in advance [£5 per head?]. Fewer people to cater for would allow a wider choice of venues as well as reducing the work.
- o The lunch break should be extended to 1hour 15minutes to allow for people leaving the venue for lunch.
- o Not catering or providing food for less people might give a wider choice of venues

Financial

Comments:

o The total income for the day was £2533.25, which covered all costs & generated a surplus of £257.59 that will be put towards Brighton Permaculture Trust's fund to provide further courses & events.

Recommendations for future:

- A larger surplus should be aimed at in the future to ensure costs are covered & to cover the cost of venues in the future.
- Costs could be reduced by streamlining the booking system & by using speakers with lower fees/travel
 expenses [Barbara Jones travelled from Yorkshire to the event]. A cheaper venue should be found if the
 event is not to be supported by BHCC.
- Ideally fees should be kept in line with this year's event minus £5 for food. People reported finding the fee structure confusing so perhaps employing the 4 teir structure used for BPT's other courses would be more appropriate. Suggested fees for next event:

 Sponsored/organisation rate or Individual income more than 25k/yr 	£55

Future events?

Recommendations for future:

- Green Architecture Day 07 should be held at the same time next year as it did not appear to clash with other events & was in term time allowing students to attend
- o BHCC to be asked if it would like to support Green Architecture Day 07
- Consider running a coach tour of "eco-buildings" in the summer of 2006 or 2007
- o BHCC to be asked if it would like to support this or would guarantee to buy a number of places
- o Consider running a straw bale building course
