


Summary

Symptom free testing has expanded across the City:

- 4,000 tests per day 70% are in schools, as they have fully reopened
- This is picking up more asymptomatic cases enabling them to self-isolate and brother the chain of transmission.
- Following the week with the lowest case rate for 5 months, in the most recent week there was a small increase in cases, accounted for by pos results following the expansion of LFD testing
- It is vital to note that every stage of the Government's roadmap will introduce social mixing and potentially increases risk highlighting the importance of social distancing and following remaining restrictions.
- The number of cases in residents aged 60+ remains low and the numb of hospital inpatients is continuing to fall positive impact of vaccination
- Following the peak in January, the number of deaths (Covid and all cau has fallen.

- Week to 10th March rate of 26.8 per 100,0 the lowest since September 2020
- Week to 17th March -33.3 cases per 100,0 an increase of 24% f a very low baseline

 - South East (35 per 100,000).






Rate of confirmed cases per 100,000 population – 7 days to 16th of March

Individuals receiving a Lateral Flow Device Test in Brighton & Hove on March 21, 2021: 5.765


7-Days average of individuals receiving a Lateral Flow Device Test in Brighton & Hove on March 18, 2021: 4,049




Case rate in aged 60 and over

Refreshed Local Outbreak Plan

Local Authorities are required to have Local Outbreak Plans for responding to Covid as part of their existing duty for protecting the health of their population.

Our original plan was published 30 June 2020

New guidance was published in 1 March 2021

- Plans should be based on tried and tested practice of breaking chains of transmission and preventing and containing outbreaks.
- Plans should address developments including
 - Responding to Variants of Concern
 - Action on any enduring transmission
 - Reflect new and developing LA roles around contact tracing, in partnership with PHE
 - Ongoing role of non-pharmaceutical interventions to prevent cases and reduce transmission
 - Interface with vaccines roll out, including local action on disparities
 - Activities to enable "living with COVID" (COVID secure)

Refreshed document to be agreed at Health Protection Board on 6 April and Local Outbreak Engagement Board on 9 April. For information Health & Wellbeing Board in June.
