### Improvements at Woodingdean Crossroads (2009)

### **Background**

Woodingdean Crossroads is an important and busy junction on the city's road network. It connects the A27 Trunk Road with the A259 coast road and is also the main connection between a large part of Woodingdean village and the city centre. Concerns have been expressed over a long period of time about the safety problems and traffic congestion experienced by local drivers and pedestrians at the junction. In order to address these problems a comprehensive scheme is required to improve the situation for everybody.

### Methodology

4144 addresses in the Woodingdean area were sent a covering letter plus a short questionnaire and a prepaid return envelope, asking for thoughts and comments in helping to determine the best way forward with options on the Woodingdean Crossroads.

A two-day staffed exhibition showing large-scale plans was held at Woodingean Youth Centre and for 6 days at Hove Town Hall, with staff on call to speak to visitors. Both sites included at least one evening and a day at the weekend.

Respondents were given options concerning the location of a pedestrian crossing on Falmer Road (north) and the arrangements for loading/parking on Warren Way (south side). The questionnaire was also made available online at the BHCC website and at the exhibitions.

A: 539 (52%) B: 395 (38%) Not Sure: 104 (10%)

### Warren Way:

C: 189 (18%) D: 732 (71%) Note Sure: 115 (11%)

### **Detailed Results**

1065 responses were received. 929 (87%) were received from the postal survey, 84 (8%) from the exhibitions and 52 (5%) from the on-line version of the survey.
